Te Pūaha o te Ako 2023-24 Outputs and Impact Summary



Te Pūaha o te Ako is CSI's multidisciplinary social impact knowledge and practice hub. As responsive resource sharing for community sector needs. Te Pūaha is Foundation North's koha to the community sector.

Our outputs

In the 2023-24 financial year we provided open source sector support via Impact and Insights resources, Te Pūaha Talks, and a podcast series in collaboration with HuiE!

> Impact and insights resources

Resources covered the following topics:

- Food sovereignty and equitable food systems drawing on research on food system inequities and solutions.
- Shifting culture and power through manaenhancing partnerships, with case studies from The Philanthropic Landscape Volume II - CSI and JRMT's collaboration funded 50% through TPOTA.
- **Funding advocacy for impact**, based on a collaborative CSI and JRMT report highlighting advocacy as a change tool.
- Funding community innovation, drawing on FN commissioned reports and lessons from the South Auckland Community Innovation Fund and back office pilots.
- Understanding impact in philanthropy. Three resources sharing findings from Foundation North's inquiry into impact: foundations, leading practice, and Te Tiriti o Waitangi considerations.



Webinars were wide-ranging and included:

- Ngahere: a series of four workshops presenting a range of tools for hauora (wellbeing) including Hā (breath) moments of guided mediations.
- Future Search: exploring how this transformative system change collaboration process works in practice.
- Human-centered communications: delivered in collaboration with the Community Comms Collective.
- Your Sphere of Influence: shared pathways for addressing climate anxiety by creating a plan for positive change and was Te Pūaha's contribution to the Auckland Climate Festival.
- Ngahere for Teams: builds on the Ngahere series with four workshops offering a range of tools and processes to foster wellbeing and connectivity.



Tātou Tātou is a collection of interviews with community leaders sharing their challenges and highlights with a focus on how they manage their wellbeing and support others to do the same.



Haumanu: we co-created a community of 15 practitioners from diverse sectors working for social impact and change. The community shared 5x online hui and 1x in person wananga.



Funder activation: extending support to funders through convening and connecting, conversations covered impact and reporting well and advocacy.


